

### Wildcatter Trail Funding Approved by TxDOT

Cyclists have been anxiously awaiting the announcement that \$10.1 million has been secured to fund the Wildcatter Trail. According to the Midland Reporter Telegram, Midland will receive \$3.7 with a local match of \$925,000. UTPB will receive \$6.4 million. The trail will start at Scharbauer Sports Complex continuing through the UTPB/ Wagner Noel area, to the airport, and the UTPB Campus. PBBA appreciates everyone that worked to make phase one of the Wildcatter a coming reality. The Midland Reporter has an article in the Weekend Edition (11-4-23) detailing the persons responsible for the planning and funding of this project.

### PALUXY PEDAL AGAIN by Berry Simpson

Saturday, October 7th, my brother, Carroll, and I rode the Paluxy Pedal in Glen Rose. This was my fourth time riding this, and our second time to ride this together.

It's a beautiful and challenging route through the north Texas hills. The roads are all up or down, seldom level, quite steep in places. The auto traffic is usually light, traffic control at intersections is good, the aid stations well-stocked and well manned with friendly volunteers.



The Paluxy Pedal is famous among north Texas bike rides for The Wall, a brutal climb 3/10 of a mile long with an advertised 19% grade.

This year Carroll and I decided to bypass The Wall. We made the decision weeks ago, knowing the holes in our training, and we didn't talk about it much once we started the ride since both of us were a little embarrassed to not give it another attempt. But neither of us are youngsters and we were aware of our training and physical condition and knew trying to ride up The Wall would be dismal at best. We'd likely spend more time walking our bikes up the slope than we would riding them.

Our morning started well. We left Granbury with plenty of time to drive to Glen Rose, unload our bikes, get kitted up, grab our race packets, and make the ride start at 8:30. It was a beautiful October morning, in the low 50s, breezy but not brutal. Our long sleeves were perfect.



We finished in Glen Rose about 11:30 am. The ride went well, except that we got a little mixed up with the various routes (there are choices of 29, 39, 53, and 60 miles). Somehow, we finished the day with only 36 miles. It was a big surprise when the finish line arrived so soon. We had planned on 53 miles. We also had another problem, unrelated to cycling, that happened before the ride started. All I can say and still maintain family confidentiality is we had a UACB (Unscheduled Automotive Control Breakdown). We made every effort before the ride started to fix the problem. We even asked for help, but no joy. By the time we finally rolled out everyone else had been gone for several minutes. We couldn't be sure we were even on the correct route until we started overtaking riders. At the first aid station, Carroll phoned his wife, Jennifer, and asked her to check with the local Ford dealership and see if they could help. That gave us another ten miles to think about our problem until the next aid station came around.

As it turns out, there is no Ford dealership in Glen Rose, and the dealership in Granbury Ford wouldn't answer their phone, so option #1 was out.

Jennifer found someone who could bring a computer and help us, so we phoned him as soon as we finished riding. Unfortunately, the soonest he could meet us was 7:00 pm. Neither of us wanted to hang around for seven hours. Carroll said, "Well, we came here to ride bikes. Let's ride to Granbury."

So we rode our bikes 22 miles north on Highway 177 to our house in Granbury. The ride was brutal. The half hour we rested while trying to decide what to do was enough time for our muscles to cool down and tighten up. Plus the post-ride slices of pizza we probably shouldn't have eaten talked to us the entire way.

The first eight miles were the worst. There was only about three feet of rough gravely shoulder for us to ride on, and half of that was cut up into rumble strips. It was unnerving to have such an unstable road with cars and trucks passing us at full highway speed.

However, after about eight miles, the road widened, and our bike lane became smoother and cleaner and more pleasant.


We were exhausted when we finally arrived at the Granbury house. We now had 58 miles for the day, and that was plenty. At least we could now enjoy the OU-Texas football game which we'd set to record while were riding. We'd maintained radio (phone, internet, and texts) silence so we wouldn't know how the football game was going. We plopped down in front of the TV and watched the first half, until it was time to head back to Glen Rose.

By the time we finally made it back to Granbury with both trucks, we grabbed dinner and watched the rest of the game. We finally had the good news, 34-30, at 9:30. Fifty-eight miles and a winning football game. It was a full day.

Paluxy Pedal and The Wall, we will be back.

#### BY-LAWS OF THE PERMIAN BASIN BICYCLE ASSOCIATION (2023)

#### ARTICLE I NAME AND PURPOSE

SECTION 1. This organization shall be known as the Permian Basin Bicycle Association.

SECTION 2. The purpose of the PBBA shall be a community organization that promotes bicycling as a sport, recreation and means of transportation in the Permian Basin area of Texas and contributes to select charitable events and entities, both monetarily and non-monetarily.

SECTION 3. specific goals of the PBBA shall include:

encouraging novice cyclists by providing organized weekly rides in both Midland and Odessa; providing out-of-town recreational tours; providing organized weekly fitness training rides in both Midland and Odessa; encouraging youth cyclists; encouraging the training of race skills by providing club races with a token or no entry fee; promoting the better understanding of cycling by PBBA members by providing informative programs at monthly meetings; promoting the better understanding of cycling by the general public; promoting bicycle safety.

#### ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

SECTION 1. Membership in the PBBA shall be open to al individuals interested in bicycling. Membership shall not be denied to an individual who resides outside the Odessa Midland metropolitan area, nor shall membership be denied to an individual who is a member of other such bicycle clubs.

SECTION 2. There shall be two classes of membership in the PBBA:

- ONE DAY INDIVIDUAL MEMBERSHIP shall be conferred on an individual who wishes to participate in PBBA activities for a single day. This membership does not include any voting privileges in PBBA business.
- ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP shall be conferred on all individuals of a single immediate family and individuals. Each individual and each individual of a family membership shall be allowed a representative vote in PBBA business.

SECTION 3. Dues for each of the membership classifications shall be levied annually and shall be due on or after January 1 and will be effective for the remainder of the calendar year. Dues shall be collected from any individual who desires to participate in PBBA activities.

### ARTICLE III GOVERNMENT

SECTION 1. The PBBA shall be governed by the board of directors. The board of directors shall consist of the officers of the executive committee defined by section 2 of this article and the committee chairpersons. They shall serve for a term of one year or until their successors are elected. The board of directors shall present to the membership all proposed major activities for ratification.

SECTION 2

- The **PRESIDENT** shall preside over and set the agenda for the club meetings, appoint the committee chairpersons with the approval of the executive committee, and represent the PBBA in matters that concern community and public relations. The president shall have authority to disburse PBBA funds for matters that concern PBBA business.
- The **VICE PRESIDENT** shall arrange the program for club meetings, assist the president and assume the duties of the president in the president's absence.
- The **MOUNTAIN BIKE DIRECTOR** oversees the operation and maintenance of the *ODESSA MOUNTAIN BIKE PARK* and *MIDLAND TRAILS PARK*. The MTB director may raise funds on behalf of the PBBA to facilitate building, improving and maintaining the parks. These activities must first be approved by the PBBA board.
- The **SECRETARY** shall record the minutes of the club meetings, and the board of directors and executive committee meetings and represent the PBBA on other matters of correspondence and administer the election of officers.
- The **TREASURER** shall manage the treasury of the PBBA to be presented to the membership at the annual meeting. The Treasurer shall have authority to disburse PBBA funds for matters that concern PBBA business. The Treasurer shall collect membership dues and keep the membership rolls current.

### ARTICLE IV STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Each standing committee shall be composed of a chairperson and an indefinite number of members. The chairperson shall preside over the committee and solicit volunteer members from the PBBA general membership.

SECTION 2. <u>The TOUR COMMITTEE</u> shall plan and execute out-of-town recreational club touring rides and provide advance notice of such tours to the newsletter editor for inclusion in the monthly newsletter. The tour chairperson shall designate a PBBA member as ride leader and a PBBA member as a SAG wagon driver (if necessary) for each tour.

SECTION 3. <u>The RACE COMMITTEE</u> shall plan and execute mountain bike, road and gravel races and provide advance notice of such races the newsletter editor for inclusion in the monthly newsletter. The race chairperson shall designate a PBBA member as race promoter and additional PBBA members as course martials (if necessary) for each race.

SECTION 4. The <u>PUBLICITY COMMITTEE</u> shall execute the publicity campaigns for the PBBA monthly meetings, tours, races and other PBBA events through social media, the PBBA newsletter and the PBBA website. They shall also be in charge of membership maintenance which shall include recruitment of new members and establishing benefits for existing members.

SECTION 5. The <u>MOUNTAIN BIKE COMMITTEE</u> shall execute the maintenance and operation of the Odessa Mountain Bike Park and Midland Trails Park under the direction of the Mountain Bike Director. They will provide programs and activities which shall promote the sport of mountain bike riding.

SECTION 6. The <u>CYCLEFEST COMMITTEE</u> shall oversee the organization and promotion of the Fort Davis Cyclefest event. As the PBBA's main fundraising event, they shall strive to make the event profitable and shall use the event to promote cycling in West Texas

#### ARTICLE V ANNUAL MEETING

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the PBBA general membership shall be held during November of each year.

SECTION 2. The time and place of the annual meeting shall be set by the officers of the PBBA and notice of such shall be included in the monthly newsletter no less than two weeks prior to said date.

SECTION 3. The business to be conducted at the annual meeting shall include:

- The election of officers for the upcoming year. Elected officers shall serve a one-year term of office which shall begin on January 1. Officers shall e elected by a simple majority of the members present at the annual meeting.
- The levy of annual membership dues. This levy shall be proposed by the officers and approved by a simple majority of the members present at the annual meeting.

The presentation by the Treasurer of the annual financial report.

### ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. This document may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any constitutionally valid meeting of the general membership

SECTION 2. A meeting shall be considered constitutionally valid if all of the following criteria have been met:

Notice of the time and place of the meeting shall be included in the monthly newsletter no less than two weeks prior to said date.

Notice of the nature of the proposed constitutional changes shall be provided with the monthly newsletter no less than two weeks prior to said meeting.
